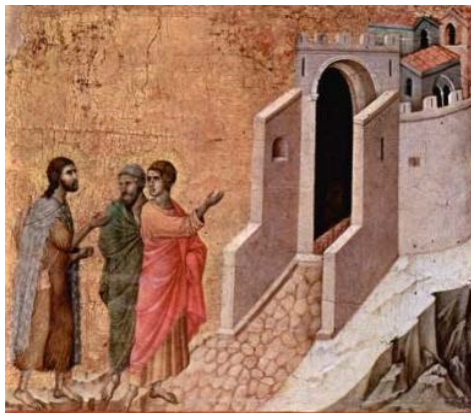

Rev. Dr. Adam Hearlson, *Assistant Professor of Preaching and Worship and the Director of Wilson Chapel in Andover Newton Theological Seminary*

Adam completed his doctorate in Homiletics at Princeton Theological Seminary. He received his B.A. from Vanguard University and M.Div. from Princeton Theological Seminary. He is an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ. Currently, Adam's research interests include the role of worship in social resistance, how the visual images are being incorporated into the preaching moment, and the role of food in Christian ritual. Adam is fascinated by the myriad of ways in which people live out their faith.



Dr. H. Luke Shaefer, *Associate Professor of Social Work at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor*

Luke research focuses on the effectiveness of the United States' social safety net in serving low-wage workers and economically disadvantaged families. His recent work explores rising levels of extreme poverty in the U.S., the impact of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program on material hardships, barriers to unemployment insurance faced by vulnerable workers, and strategies for increasing access to oral health care in the United States. Luke is the director of Poverty Solutions at the University of Michigan, an interdisciplinary initiative that seeks to inform, identify, and test innovative strategies to prevent and alleviate poverty.



Rev. Dr. Chip Hardwick

Chip is the former Director of Theology, Worship, and Education for the Presbyterian Mission Agency of the Presbyterian Church (USA) (2012-2017). An ordained PCUSA pastor, he served as at Second Presbyterian Church in Bloomington, Illinois, a new church development outside of Princeton, New Jersey, the North Avenue Presbyterian Church in Atlanta, Georgia, and congregations in New York City, London, England, and Madrid, Spain. He has a BA degree from Alma College, an MBA degree from the Kellogg School at Northwestern University, and a Th.M. degree from the Candler School of Theology at Emory University.



Rev. Dr. Eric Barreto, *Frederick and Margaret L. Weyerhaeuser Associate Professor of New Testament*

Eric holds a BA in religion from Oklahoma Baptist University, an M.Div. from Princeton Theological Seminary, and a PhD in New Testament from Emory University. Prior to coming to Princeton Seminary, he served as Associate Professor of New Testament at Luther Seminary, and also taught as an adjunct professor at the Candler School of Theology and McAfee School of Theology. As a Baptist minister, Eric has pursued scholarship for the sake of the church, and he regularly writes for and teaches in faith communities around the country.



Tracee Glab, *Curator of Collections and Exhibitions at the Flint Institute of Arts*

Tracee holds an MA in art history from Wayne State University and a BA in art history from the University of Michigan-Dearborn. She has been at the FIA since 2009 and during that time, she has curated more than a dozen special exhibitions, including the most recent *Pressed for Time: The History of Printmaking*. Prior to her position in Flint, she worked at the Detroit Institute of Arts, editing several collection and exhibition catalogues, as well as serving as the editor of the museum's scholarly journal. Tracee has been a Kirk member since 2014 and has served on the Adult Ministry Committee for the past two years.



Rev. Fernando Rodriguez, *Pastor for Missional Renewal at Kirk in the Hills*

Fernando began his work at the Kirk in June 2017. He received his Masters of Divinity in 2008 from Princeton Theological Seminary. Most recently, he served as Innovator for Emergent Ministries at New Castle Presbytery in Middletown, DE. He and his wife, Kecelyn, have two young children.
