It's World Communion Sunday . . .

World Communion Sunday was born November 1, 1936. In the winter of 1935, some ministers met to study the spiritual needs and possibilities of the church in the midst of the Great Depression. In the Lord's Supper, they saw a prime opportunity to unite Christians in rededication to the Lord Jesus Christ. In 1937, General Assembly changed the date of World Communion to the first Sunday of October.

In this holy meal, we who are many are made one, united with Christ and with the faithful in every time and place. The unity given in this Sacrament is a sign of the unity God wills for all creation. Thus, made one at the table of our Lord, we offer ourselves anew in obedient service to God's reign as we await the fulfillment of the kingdom Christ proclaimed: "People will come from east and west, from north and south, and sit at table in the kingdom of God."

Pastor's Message

Greetings:

Sometimes it feels like the world is coming at us so quickly that we don't know which way to turn, where to look, what to do next. In a chaotic world, we find strength in knowing that God is always near. That is why I'm grateful for *A Season of Peace* we are in, which culminates with the Peace & Global Witness offering on World Communion Sunday. The ministries of peacemaking and reconciliation witness to the Prince of Peace. It is good to be reminded that, with all the discord, pain, and conflict in our communities and in the world, we serve a God who promises harmony and responds to violence with reconciliation and peace.

The Peace & Global Witness Offering draws Presbyterians together and provides education and exposure to those who show us how to do this work well. It has helped support our church partners in Madagascar recover from years of destructive development. Scriptural resources helped congregations, like the one in Old Bergen, New Jersey, find common ground with neighbors of many faiths, bringing their children together to learn from one another and to build a peaceful future. And the whole church joins together, through this Offering, to work for an end to all forms of human trafficking, specifically, the sin of child soldiers.

This is why we give to the Peace & Global Witness offering. We give because we know that every level of society is in need of Christ's peace – at all times, in all ways. From our congregation, where this year we retain 25 percent of this offering to support South Oakland Citizens for the Homeless WELCOME INN; to the region, where 25 percent is retained by Detroit Presbytery and the Synod of the Covenant to support peacemaking efforts being pursued, together with our neighboring congregations; and to the ends of the earth, where the remaining 50 percent is deployed by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to join the peacemaking efforts of church partners all over the globe. We join these monetary gifts with our prayers for peace and our work for justice.

You are invited to visit the Peace & Global Witness website (www.presbyterianmission.org/peace-global) to find out more information on how your support of this offering helps. As a community of faith, we want to deepen our commitment to peacemaking so that it becomes a visible and profound witness to our community. I challenge each of us to consider how we might increase our witness, and increase our giving to the Peace & Global Witness Offering. I pray that the God of Peace might open the generosity in our hearts to join with Christians all over the country on World Communion Sunday, October 7, in response to the Peace & Global Witness Offering.

As Presbyterians, we claim Jesus Christ as Prince of Peace and pattern our lives in the compassion, kindness and grace that he shows us.

<u>Some</u> Information from the *Holy Cow!* Survey

Last spring, 67 individuals completed the Holy Cow! Conversations Survey about Northminster Church. This represents 82% of the people invited to take the survey, an extremely high percentage.

The bulk of the questions on the survey were answered by a six-option continuum:

Strongly Disagree Tend to Tend Agree Strongly
Disagree to Agree Agree

For purposes of the tabulation, *Holy Cow!* identifies "Agree and Strongly Agree" as responses that **CLEARLY AGREE** with the statement. Likewise, "Disagree and Strongly Disagree" are responses the **CLEARLY DISAGREE** with the statement. The responses marked "Tend to Agree/Disagree" are identified as **ON THE FENCE**.

The following 4 statements from the Survey define Key Indicators of the congregation's life:

Overall Satisfaction (Shalom or Wholeness)

On the whole, I am satisfied with how things are in our church.

Clearly agree 23%

On the fence 53%

Clearly disagree 24%

Rating of church satisfaction level average*

Overall Energy (Passion or Engagement)

It seems to me that we are just going through the motions of church activity. There isn't much excitement about it among our members.

Clearly agree 14%
On the fence 55%

Clearly disagree 32%

Rating of church energy level average*

Church Vitality Trend

Compared to three years ago, would you say the church is

Clearly weaker 85%

About the same 13%

Clearly stronger **2%**

Rating of vitality trend very low*

Value of Church Activity Beyond Worship

Participating in church activities beyond worship is very meaningful to me. Clearly agree 65%

Survey Results, continued

Here are the **Top Three Priorities** where the congregation felt *additional energy* should be placed to expand or improve Northminster's ministries:

FIRST

Discern how our ministries might be strengthened by exploring a variety of options for our future (e.g. shared pastoral leadership, merger, change of worship venue).



SECOND

Explore how the church facility might be adapted to become a greater community asset that would increase utilization.

THIRD

Work to renew and revitalize the community around the church by building coalitions with partners that share this vision and commitment.

The Session continues to review the totality of the Survey results as it works on the various other aspects of the Self Study process, seeking to determine where God is calling Northminster to serve. As further Self Study information is gathered, the Session will share insights for the church's present and future with the congregation.
