Faith In Action Grant Program

"Faith by itself, if it has not works, is dead." – James 2:17

The Presbytery of Detroit has been given an anonymous gift of \$350,000 to be used for mission by congregations and their mission partners within the Presbytery. The goal is for all of the money to be disbursed in about a year's time. This program aims to 1) incubate new types of mission work, 2) energize new and existing mission initiatives to achieve new levels of faith in action, and 3) respond to mission requests that need urgent attention. The intent is not to fund day-to-day operations or support an existing operating budget.

The work group has determined that the grant program will have two phases. The first phase will disburse many smaller amounts of money and in the second phase larger amounts of funding will be available. The second phase will be launched in further detail in June 2018.

In Phase I, grants of up to \$1,000 will be made available for the first 30 congregations to respond with the following criteria by email between March I - 31 (please do not send applications before March I, 2018):

- The project must be "hands-on". I.e., the church should not simply pass this money through to another organization, but use it to encourage their members to put faith into action.
- Send us 2-3 sentences that answer the questions: How does your church hope to impact your community? Who do you hope to serve? How are you going to do it? What is the hoped for outcome?
- How much money do you need (up to \$1000)?
- A copy of minutes of session approval of grant application.

This money will be sent to the congregation in May and must be used by October 1, 2018. For accountability, to share the good news about what our Presbytery is doing, and to inspire one another, each church receiving a Phase 1 grant will be required to send back a photo, quote, and/or short narrative about how the money was spent.


